



Key Dates:

August 11 - Doorknocking begins.
September 30 - Last day to respond.

Quick Facts:

As of 7/7, 52.2% (about 175,800) of Boston's households have responded.

In 2010, the final response rate was 64.4%.

Over the phone, or by mail.

13 different languages available.

Boston depends on your

household to respond. For every person not counted, *nearly* \$2,400 per year in federal funding is *lost* for the next ten years.

Background on Fund

Background

- \$5,350,000 fund created in 2013
- Community benefit associated with Harvard's Institutional Master Plan, in agreement with Boston Planning and Development Agency and City of Boston
- Support projects that <u>enhance the public realm</u> and for which <u>public sources of financing may be unavailable or inadequate</u>.
- Public realm = streets, sidewalks, parks, etc.
- PRIMARILY for investments on public property
- ~\$2,000,000 uncommitted

Other Funds

- Harvard Allston Partnership Fund
 - \$100,000 distributed annually to non-profits serving the North Allston-North Brighton community
- Boston College Neighborhood Improvement Fund
 - Similar to Flex Fund, investments in parks and public realm improvements

Criteria and Eligibility

Applicant Eligibility

- Public agencies (e.g. Boston Parks and Recreation)
- Non-profits (e.g. Artists for Humanity)
- Organizations with a fiscal sponsor (e.g. Friends of Herter Park)
- Sometimes individuals, possibly for-profits [case by case]
- Public agency as a proponent or partner for projects on public property
- Sound financial condition with adequate reporting and controls
- Ability to execute the proposed project or program



Project Eligibility

- Public realm enhancements, public parks and open space, neighborhood beautification, non-vehicular mobility improvements, streetscape improvements, public safety (e.g. transportation safety)
- Primarily for projects located on public property but potentially for property with public access OR projects that otherwise meaningfully enhance the public realm



Project Eligibility

- Achieve at least ONE of the following:
 - Enhance the aesthetic quality and user experience of the public realm
 - Enhance public safety
 - Enhance local business and economic activity
 - Support non-vehicular modes of transportation
 - Promote collaboration and civic and cultural growth
 - Showcase unique qualities of the Allston-Brighton neighborhood



Project Eligibility

- Demonstrates community support
- Public funding is not available or insufficient
- Located in Allston-Brighton, emphasis on area north of I-90
- In MOST cases, located on public property
- Planning and design, capital improvements, programming, temporary installations are all eligible
- Routine maintenance is NOT eligible



Additional Review Criteria

- Demonstrate potential for public engagement as a project outcome
- Demonstrate other sources of funding
- Partnerships with other organizations and utilization of community volunteers
- Project readiness

Accounting and Past Projects



Accounting

- \$5,350,000 original fund
- ~\$2,000,000 currently still uncommitted
- Grants have ranged from \$3,400 to \$1,900,000



Sample Past Projects

- Boston Bikes: Bluebikes stations (\$50,000)
- Boston Police Department: VMS boards (\$96,000)
- Charlesview: outdoor public programming (\$8,850)
- Artists for Humanity: artistic bike racks (\$65,000)
- Gardner Pilot Academy: outdoor gardens + turf field (\$66,000 + 75,000)
- Friends of Herter Park: amphitheater improvements (\$50,000 + 50,000)
- Public art: Lincoln/Franklin Street intersection (\$100,000)
- Pollinator Pathways: improvements at Everett Street/Herter Park (\$68,000)
- Mayor's Office of Arts and Culture: Allston Cultural Plan (\$50,000)
- Boston Housing Authority: improvements at Faneuil Gardens (\$226,000)
- Boston Parks and Recreation: Smith Field (\$185,000 + \$1,900,000)



Application Process

- 1. Review guidelines and sample applications and access online application at bit.ly/harvardflexfund
- 2. Submit application online and upload supporting materials
 - Longer narrative, images, letters of support in .pdf format
- 3. Deadline tentatively set for October 9 but CHECK WEBSITE FOR UPDATES
- 4. Presentations shortly after deadline; Exec Committee holds open meeting same day or shortly after, announces decisions
- 5. BPDA Board Vote
- 6. Grantees sign grant agreements with BPDA, checks disbursed




