Article 80 of the Boston Zoning Code

What is it?

- Adopted by the Boston Zoning Commission in 1996
- Provides certain requirements for the review of specific development projects in all of the neighborhoods of Boston
- Provides important opportunities for community involvement and feedback




Resident

When it is used?



New construction exceeding 50,000 square feet

A change of use without significant new construction exceeding 50,000/100,000 square feet*

*100,000 square feet in the Downtown neighborhood

• Large Project Review may also apply to the substantial rehabilitation of an existing building ≥ 100,000 square feet

Key Terms

LOI- Letter of Intent

The first document filed by a project proponent with the BPDA during the Article 80B process. This document summarizes the general details of the proposed project and triggers the nomination process for the formation of an Impact Advisory Group (IAG).

PNF - Project Notification Form

The second document filed by a project proponent with the BPDA during the Article 80B process. This document describes the features of the proposed project in detail and is available for public review and comment.

Scoping Session

A meeting hosted by the BPDA for the City's public agencies and project proponent. This meeting provides the project proponent with an opportunity to receive feedback from all the relevant agencies based on the PNF.

Scoping Determination

A BPDA document which may be issued during the Article 80B process after the filing of a PNF. If, after review of a project's PNF by the BPDA, city agencies, and the public, it is determined that additional information is required, the BPDA will issue a Scoping Determination which details which areas of the proposal require further study, to be included in a DPIR.

DPIR- Draft Project Impact Report

A document filed by a project proponent with the BPDA, if a Scoping Determination is issued by the BPDA. The DPIR includes detailed technical analysis of a project impacts and may be commented on by the BPDA, city agencies, and the public.

PAD- Preliminary Adequacy Determination.

A BPDA document which may be issued during the Article 80B process after the filing of a DPIR. If, after review of a project's DPIR by the BPDA, city agencies, and the public, it is determined that additional information is required, the BPDA will issue a Preliminary Adequacy Determination which details which areas of the proposal require further study, to be included in a FPIR.

FPIR- Final Project Impact Report

A document filed by a project proponent with the BPDA, if a PAD is issued by the BPDA. The FPIR includes more detailed analysis of project impacts and may be commented on by the BPDA, city agencies, and the public before the BPDA can issue its Adequacy Determination.


Adequacy Determination


A document Issued by the BPDA when a project undergoing Article 80B review has fully addressed and mitigated its impacts as presented in a FPIR.

BCDC- Boston Civic Design Commission


An appointed commission which advises the BPDA and the City of Boston on the design of projects of special civic or urban design significance. The BCDC meets in regularly-scheduled public meetings to review project designs.









Process 1 of 3: Pre-file Stage




Process 2 of 3: Under Review Stage

- Indicates opportunities for community members to participate in the process



Impact Advisory Groups (IAG)

Citywide Applicability

Who is the (IAG)?

An IAG is made up of **up to 15 individuals from the impacted neighborhood** that are nominated by the local elected officials (district City Councilor, Councilors at Large, State Representative, and State Senator), the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, and the BPDA Planning Department.

What is the role of the IAG?

IAGs advise both the BPDA and the developer on the potential impacts of a proposed project and suggest potential mitigation measures.


When are IAGs used?

Any project that triggers Article 80B Large Project Review will have an Impact Advisory Group.



Assembly of an IAG








The Large Project Review Poster




