








Massachusetts,

United States






Boston has the largest and most diverse Caribbean population in the state. Large Puerto **Rican populations are** in Hampden County and Worcester and **Dominicans are in** Lawrence.



63% of Caribbeans live in Dorchester, Hyde Park, Mattapan, or Roxbury





While Boston's population has increased by 16% since 1980, its Caribbean population has increased by 212%








Over 127,000 Caribbeans live in Boston






60% of Boston's Caribbeans identify as Hispanic or Latino and 37% as Non-Hispanic Black alone







Dominicans, Puerto Ricans, and Haitians have larger shares of children but overall the Caribbean population is more likely to be older, (35 to 64)





Caribbeans are more likely to be foreign born and female than all Boston residents










Over 83,000 Caribbeans speak only English or speak it very well and 31% have limited English proficiency






Caribbean young adults in Boston are less likely to be enrolled in colleges and universities than other young adult residents





Cuban and Barbadian adults have educational attainment similar to all Boston adults, while over a third of Dominican and Puerto Rican adults never finished high school








Caribbean labor force participation is similar to other Boston populations






Nearly 60,000 Caribbean residents in Boston are employed and are over represented in lower-skilled jobs






Nearly 10,000 Caribbean women work in healthcare support and personal care jobs






Only Barbadians and Dominicans have higher shares of business owners than other Boston residents





Boston's Caribbean full-time workers earn less than other Boston resident workers








Most Caribbean populations are more likely to live in family households






Dominicans and Puerto Ricans have lower levels of homeownership
