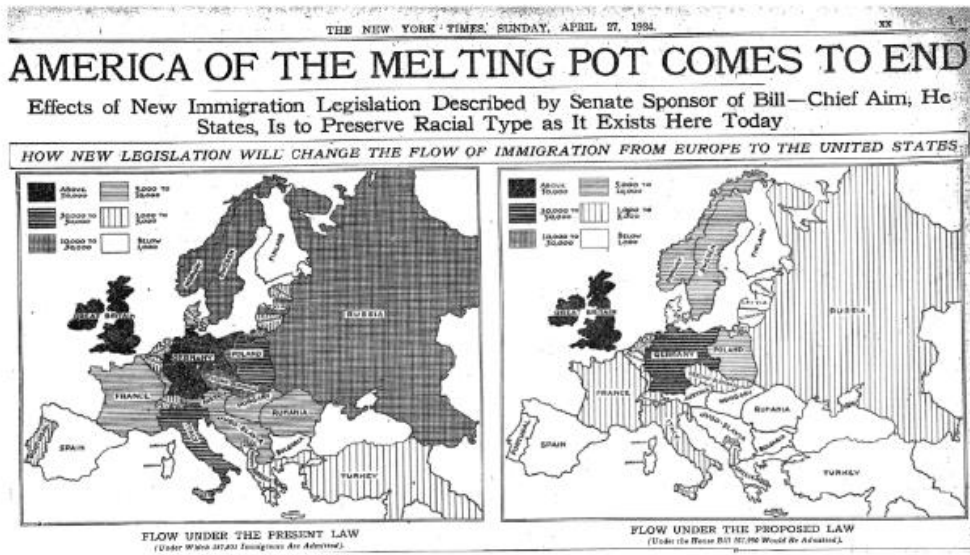

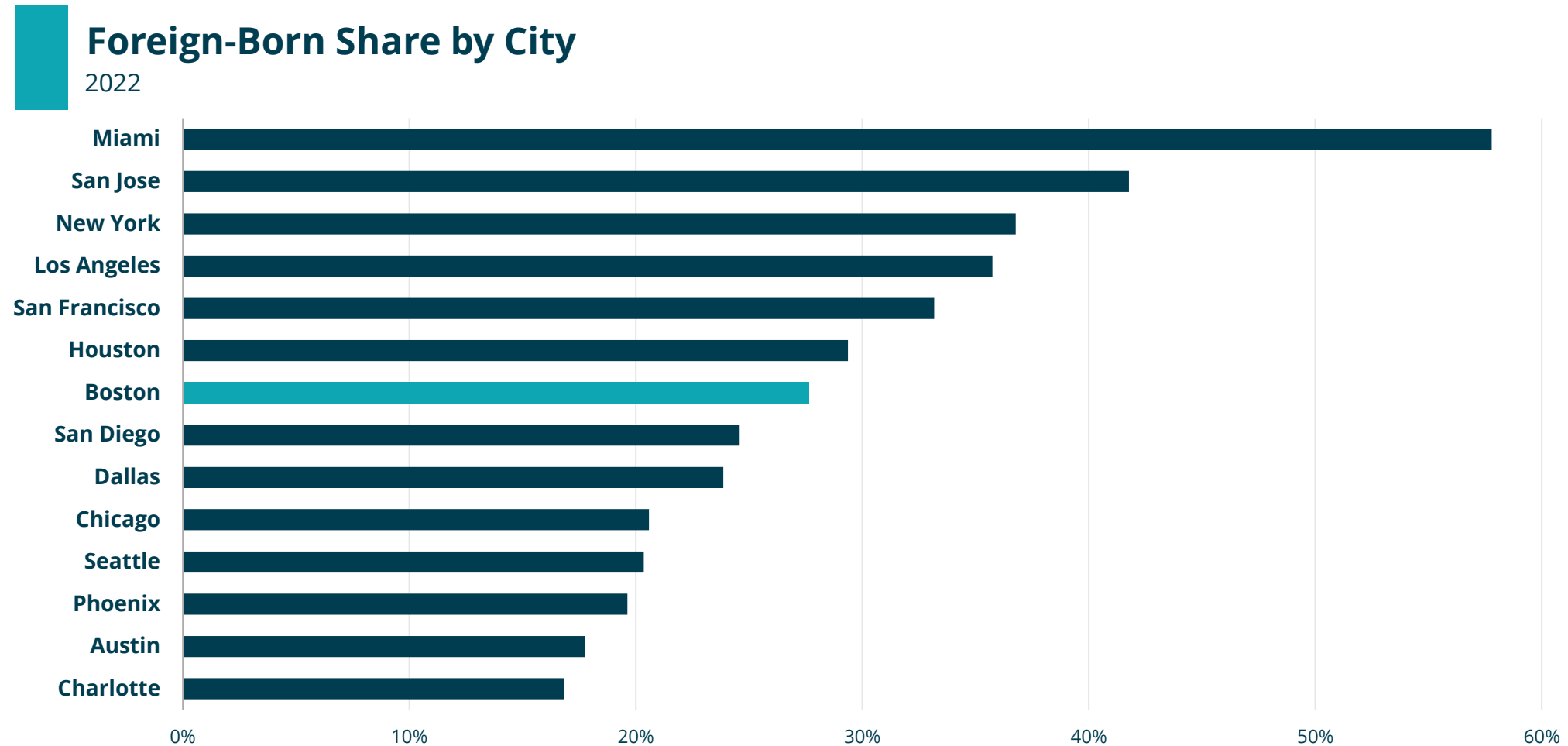

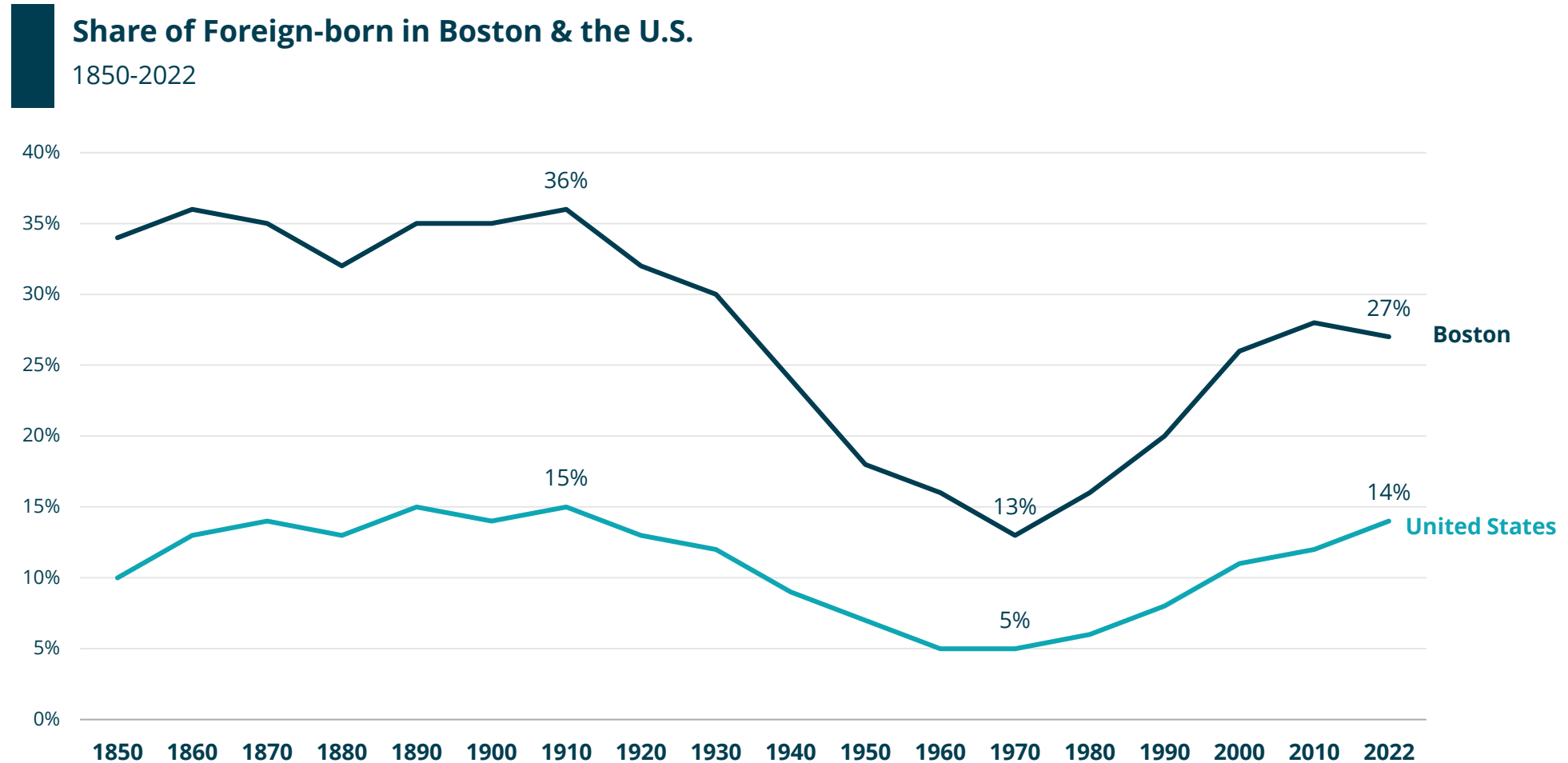


Boston ranks 7th among 15 comparable cities in its foreign-born share

US immigration policy changed the quantity and origin of immigration

Three major changes to the law, 1924-1990

Immigration Act of 1924 (Johnson-Reed Act)

- Lower cap on immigrants per year. Establish “national origins” quotas at 2% of population in 1890, which favored Western European immigrants

Immigration and Nationality Act of 1965 (Hart-Celler Act)

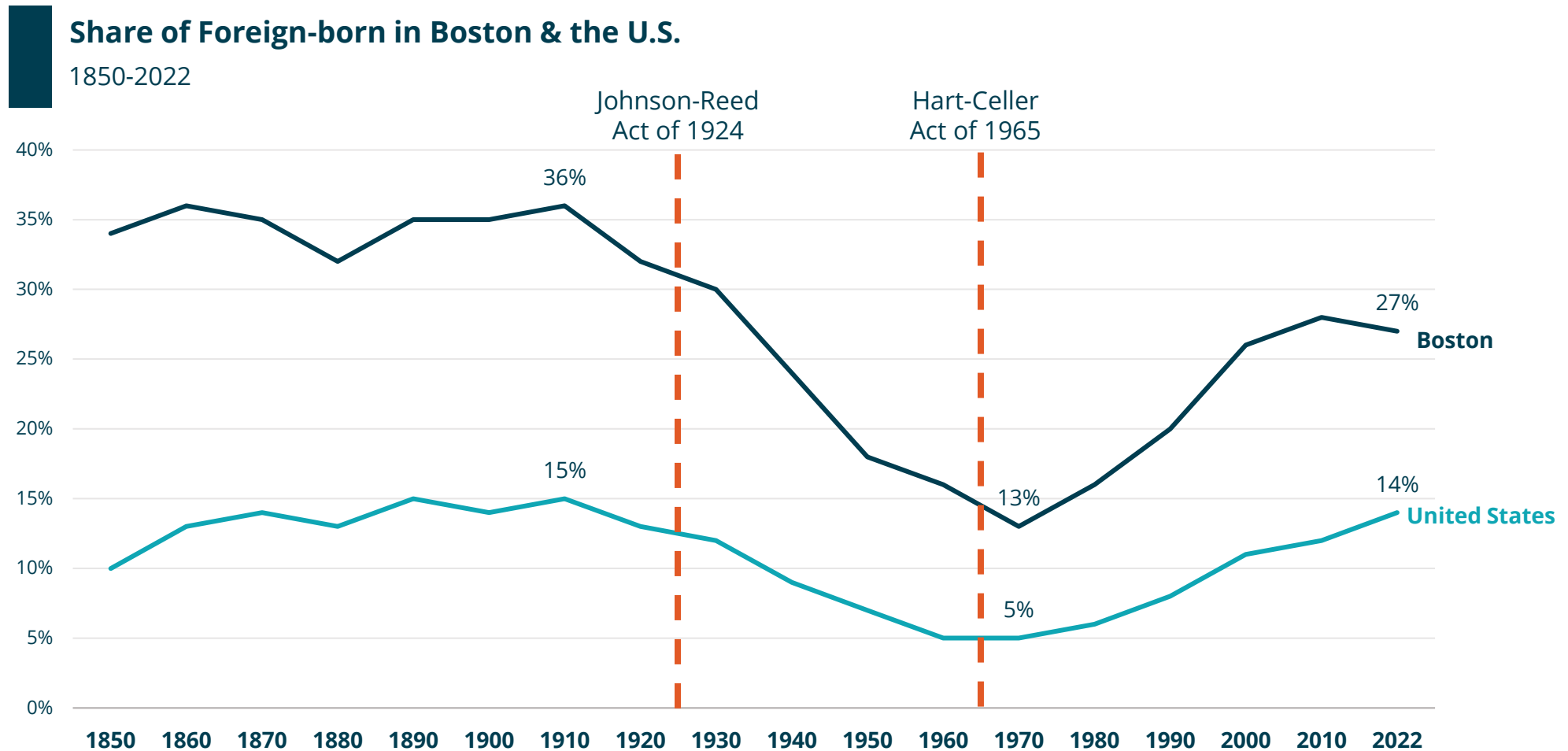
- System of preferences for family reunification (75%), employment (20%) and refugees (5%): allowed increased immigration, especially from non-European countries

Immigration Act of 1990

- Implemented the H-1B visa program for skilled temporary workers, some provisions for converting to permanent status, and a diversity lottery

The foreign-born share fell after the 1924 immigration restrictions and rebounded after 1965

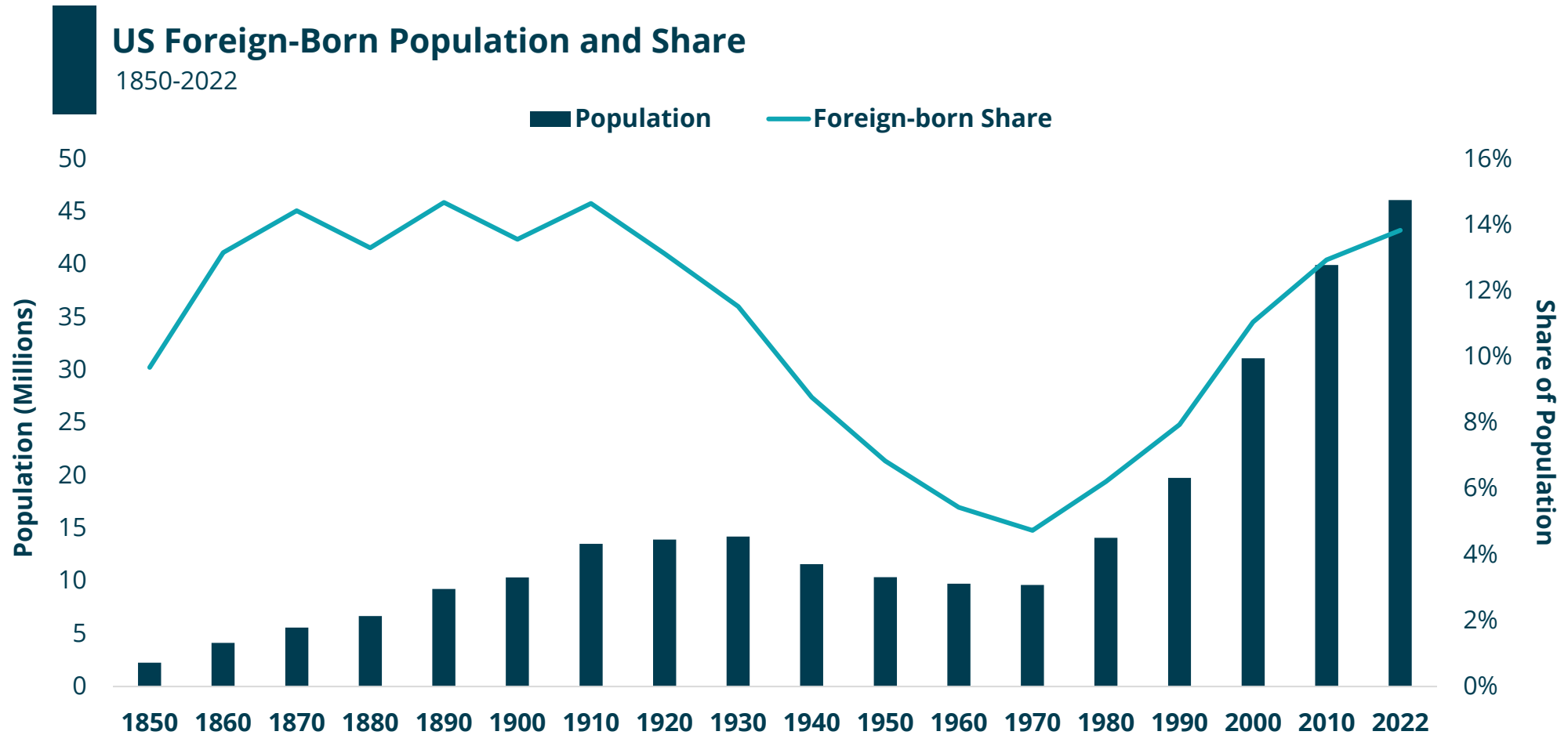

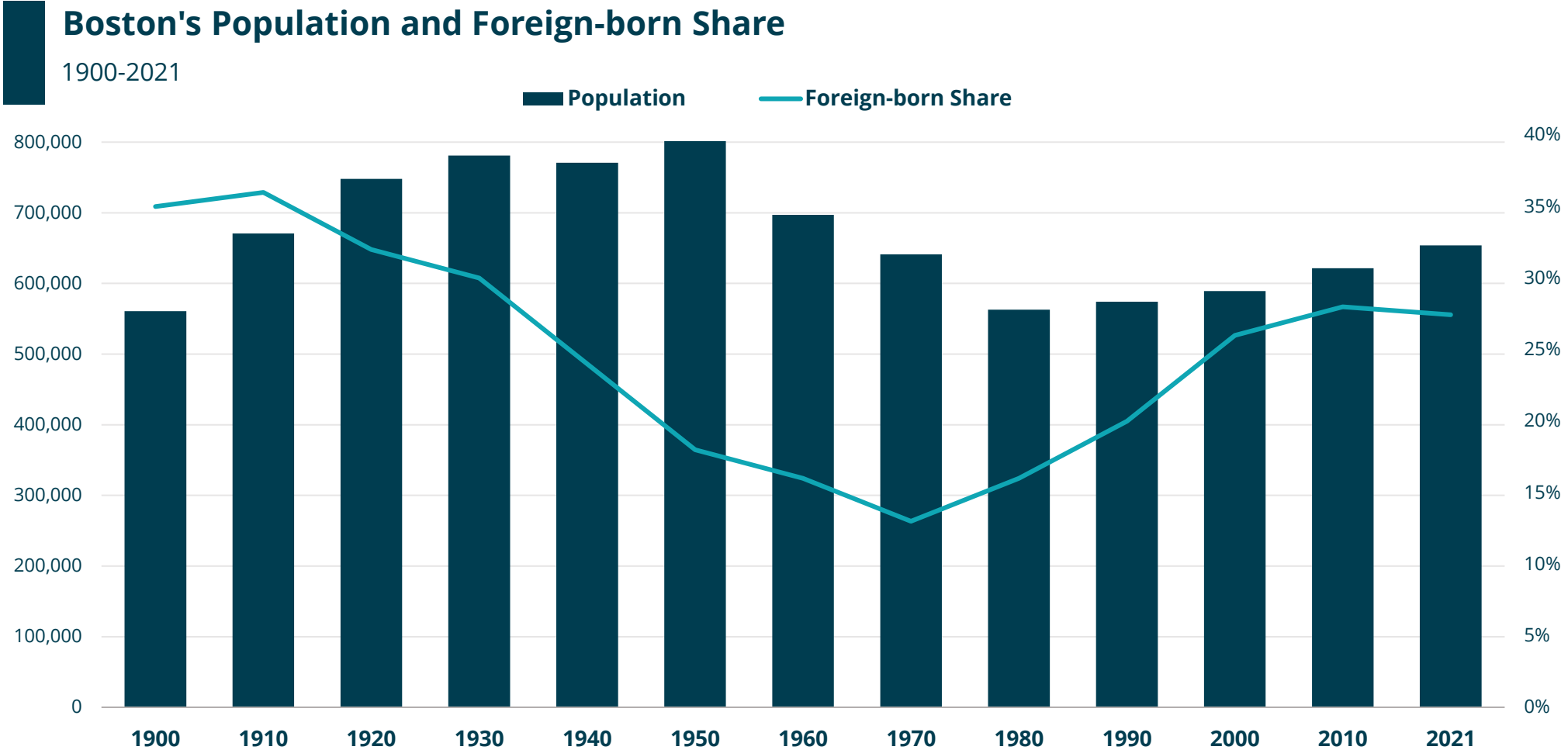
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Since the 1970s, the foreign-born population and share has increased in the US



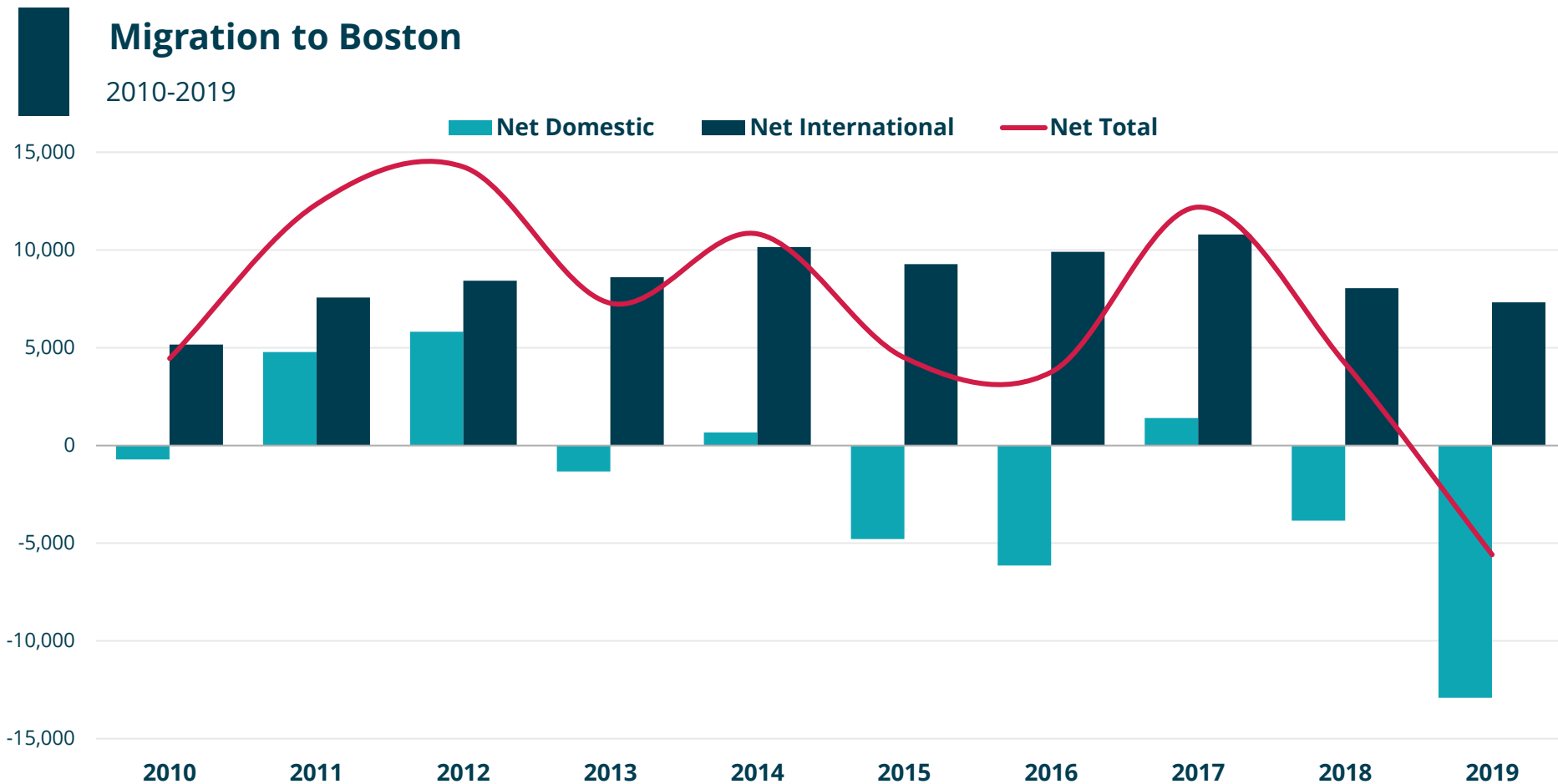

Increased immigration after 1970 helped Boston's population recover



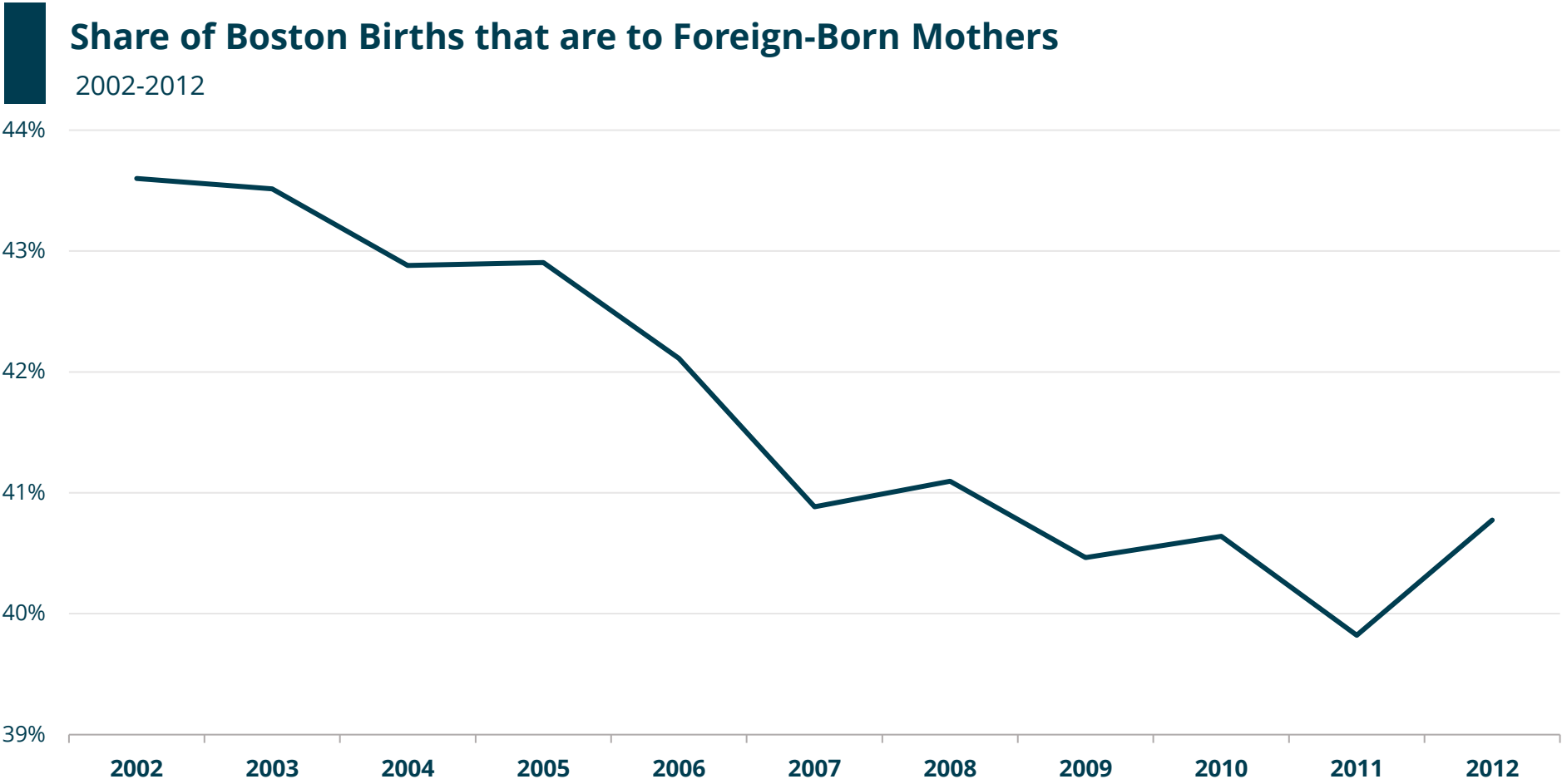

In the last decade domestic migration to Boston decreased, but international migration remained steady



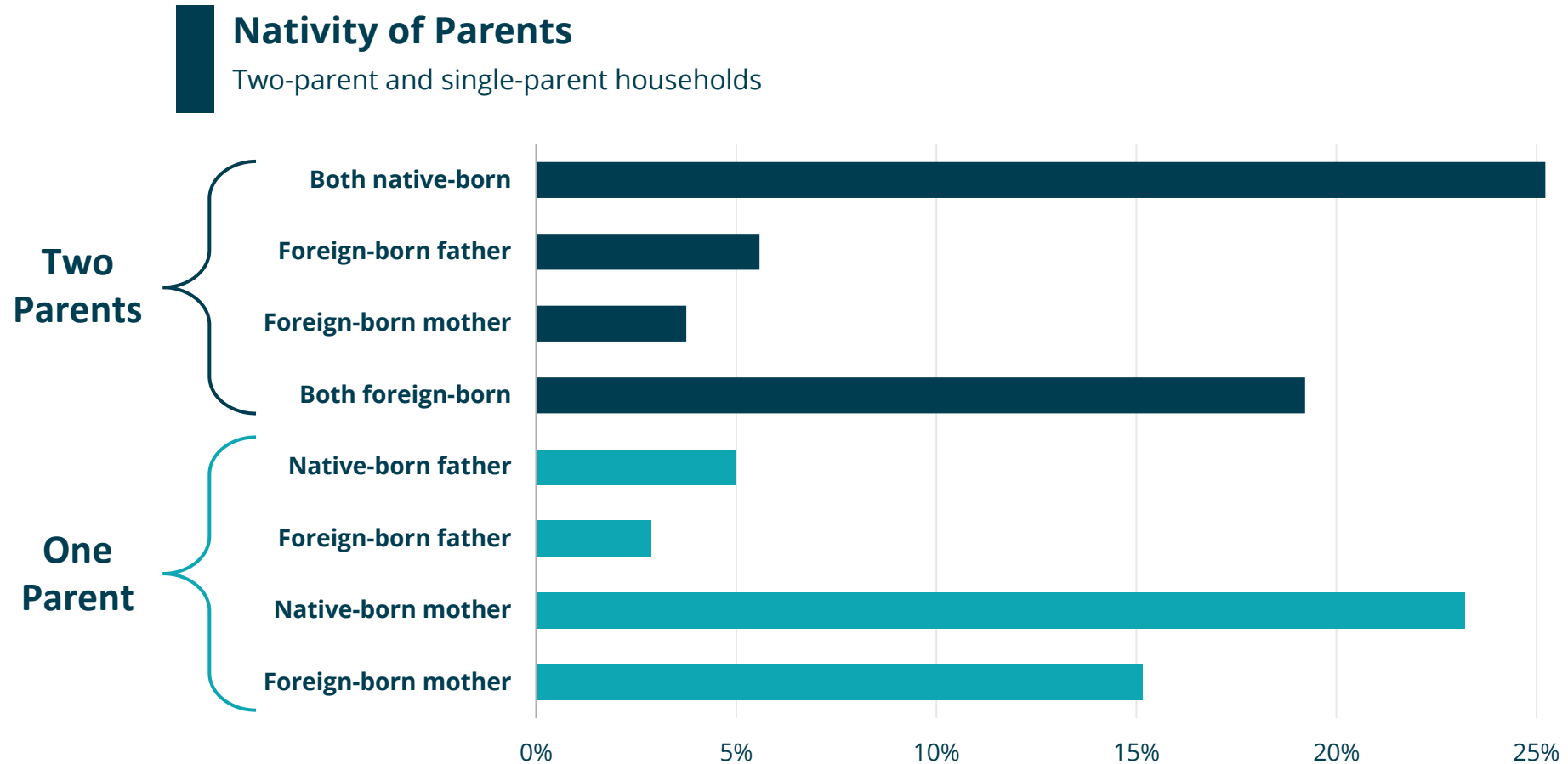

40-45% of Births in Boston were to Foreign-born Mothers Between 2002 and 2012

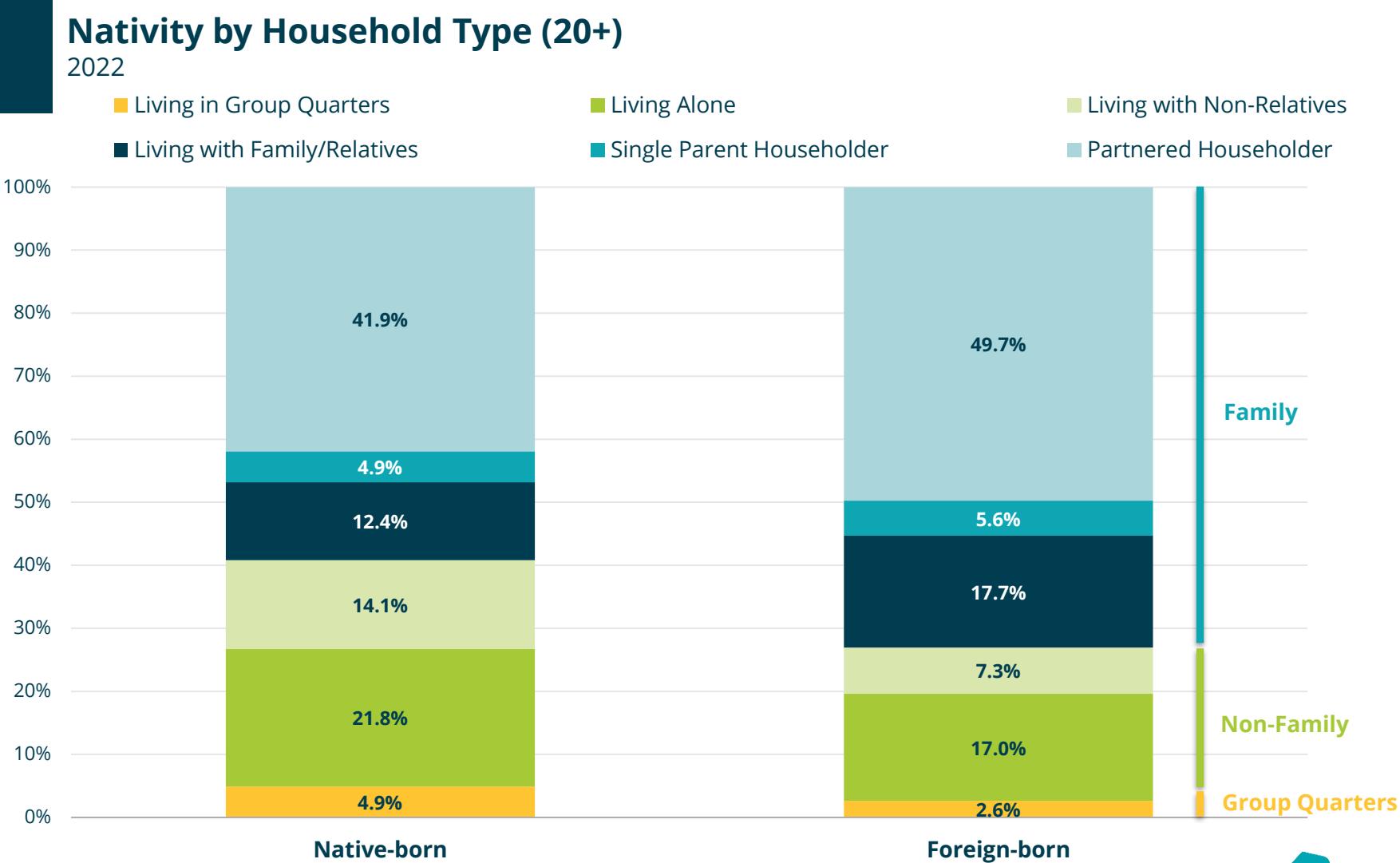

Only ~5% of Boston's children are foreign born, but 47% have at least 1 foreign-born parent

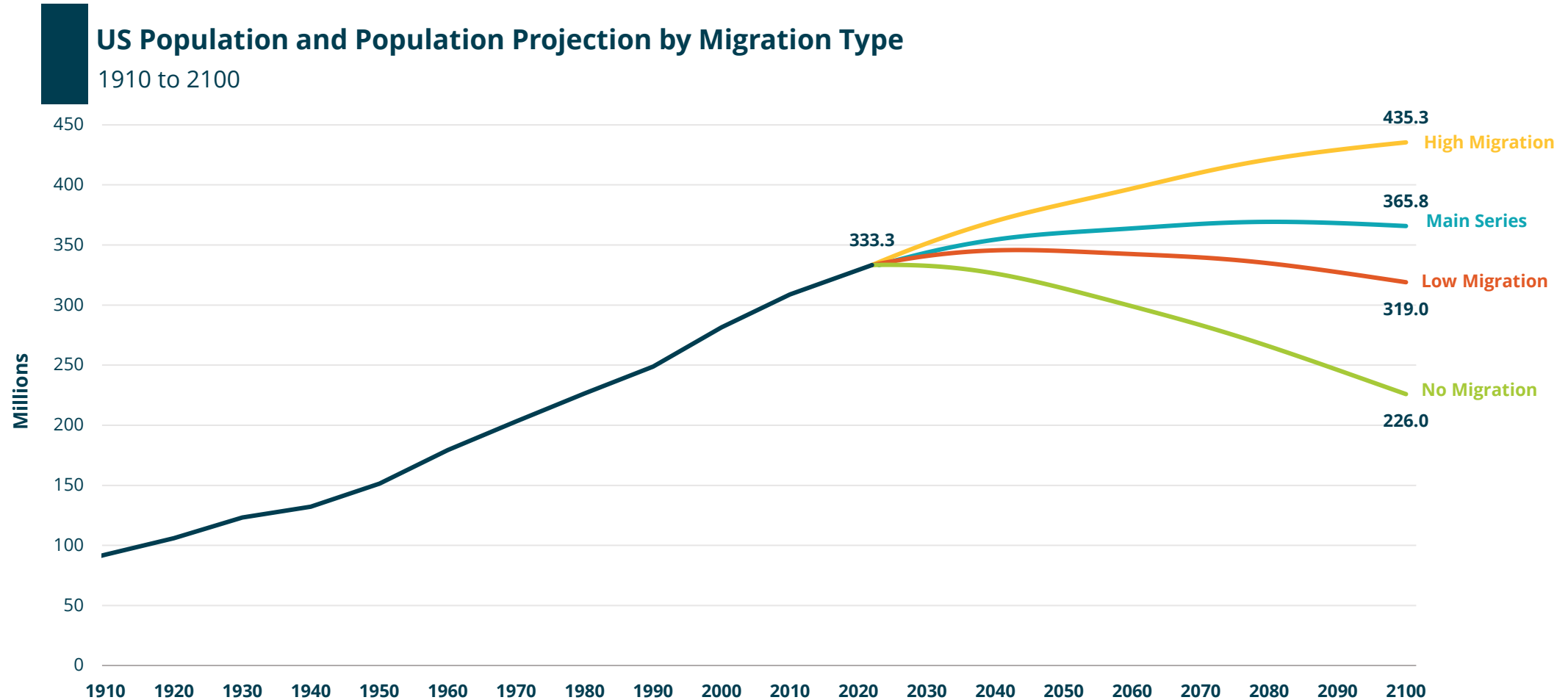


The foreign born are more likely to live in family households



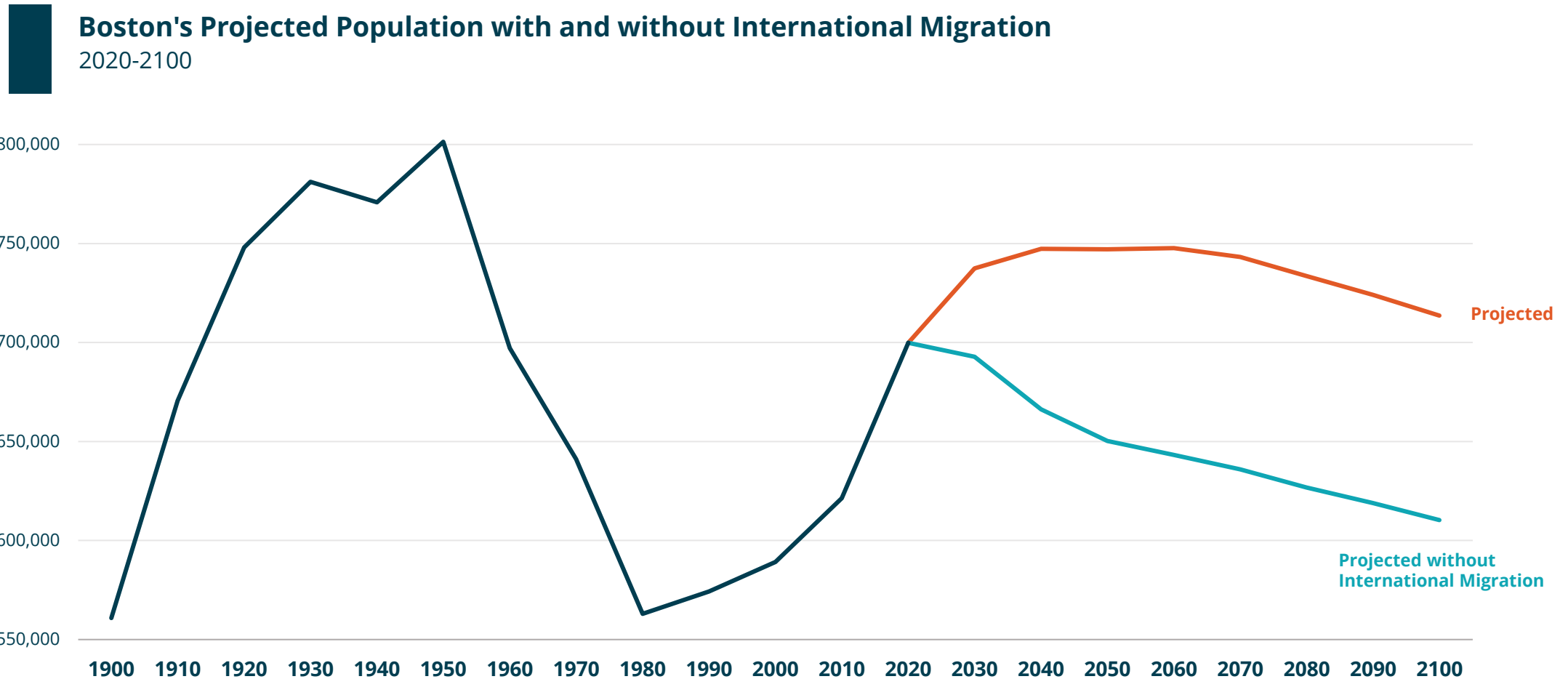

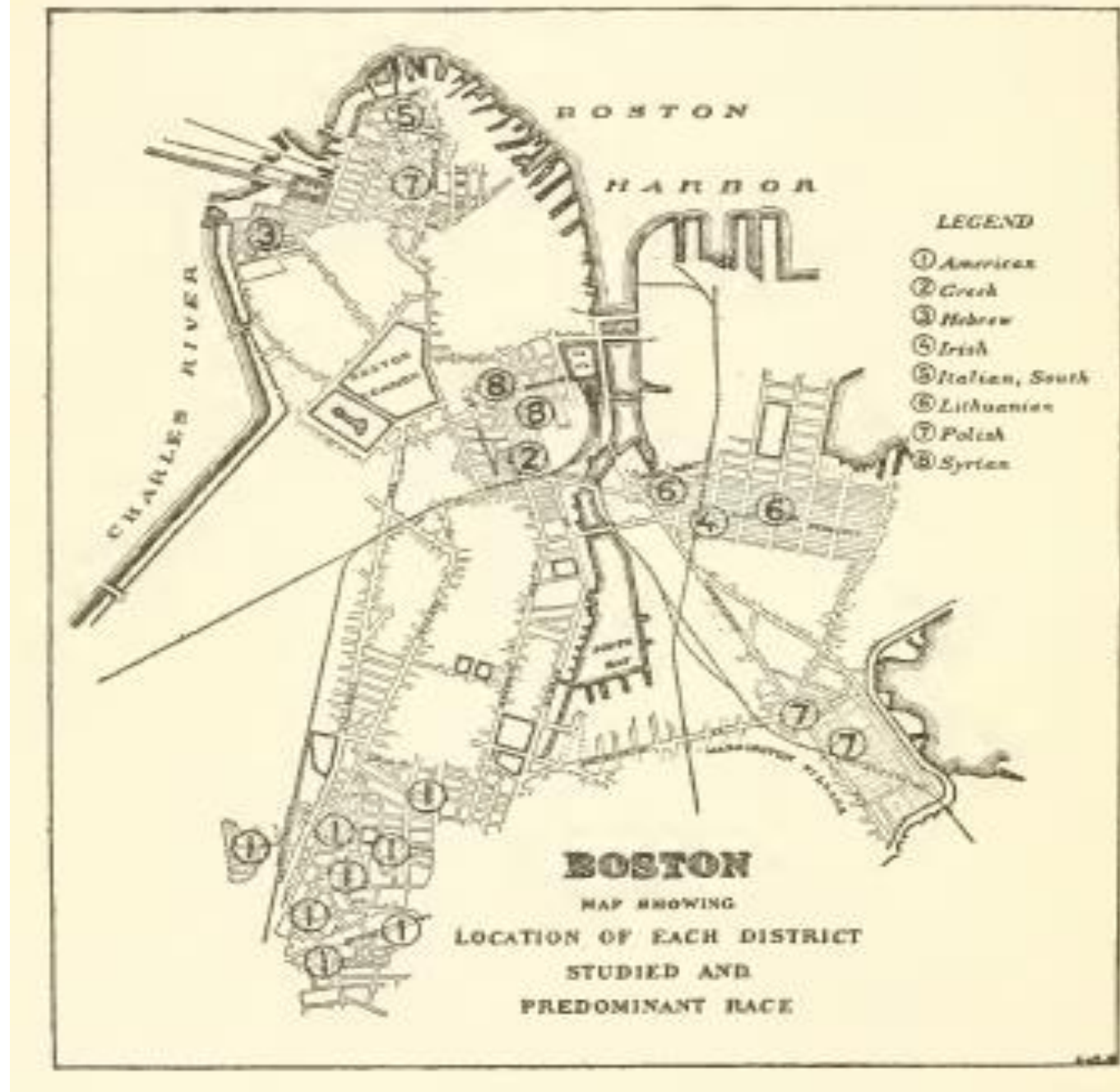

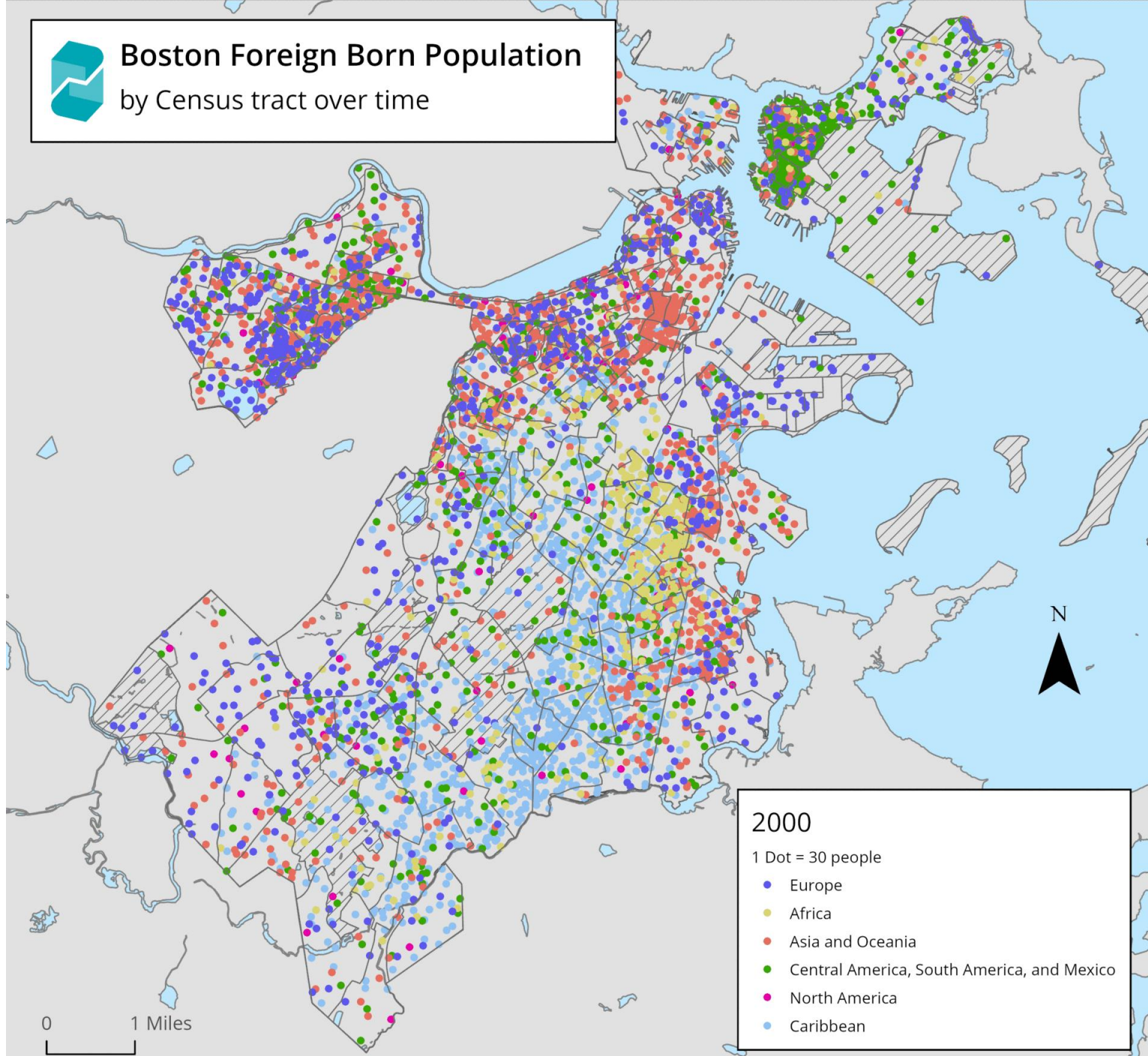

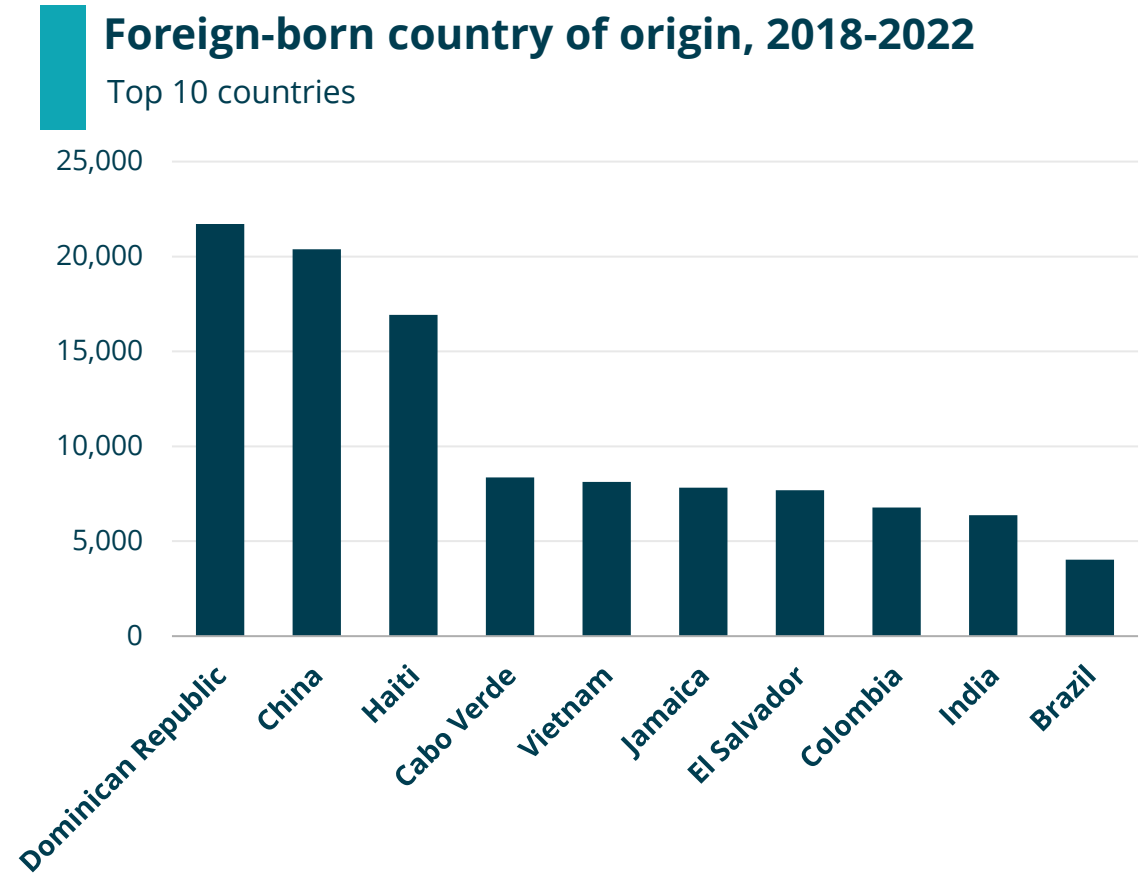
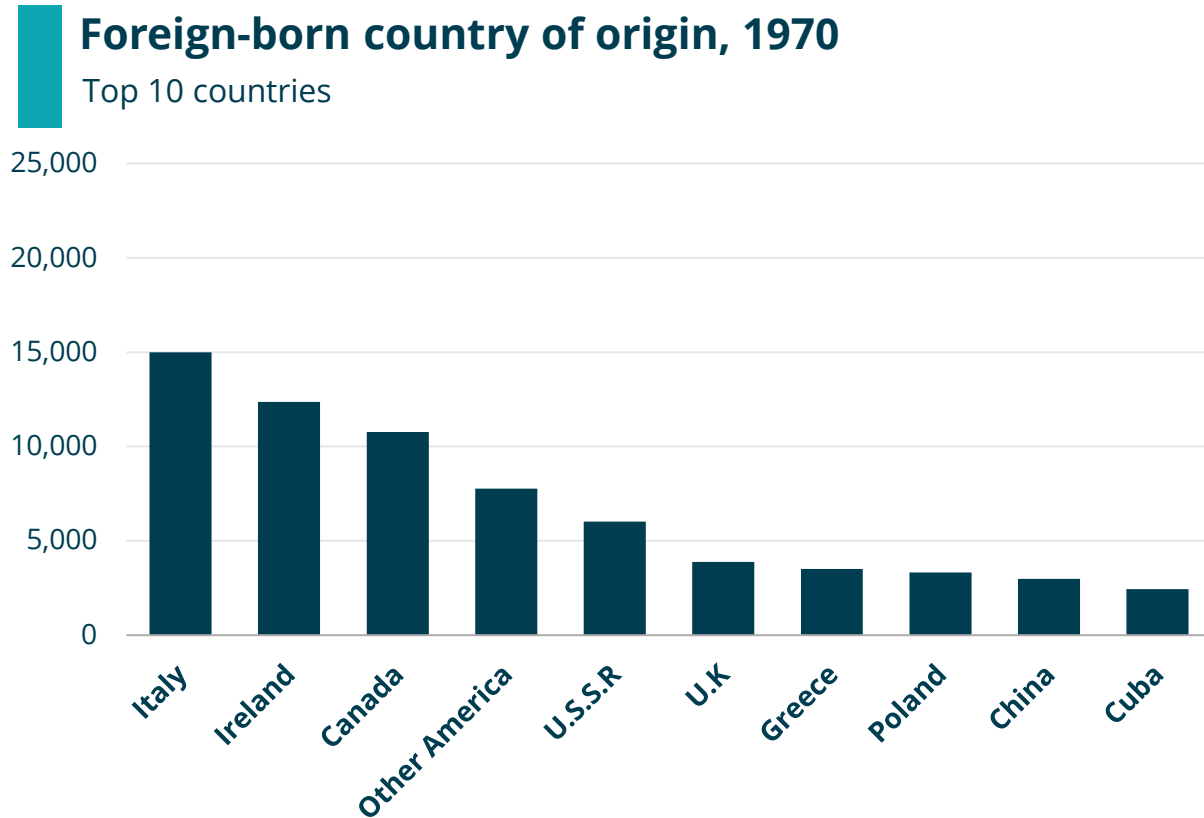


Boston Foreign Born Population

by Census tract over time



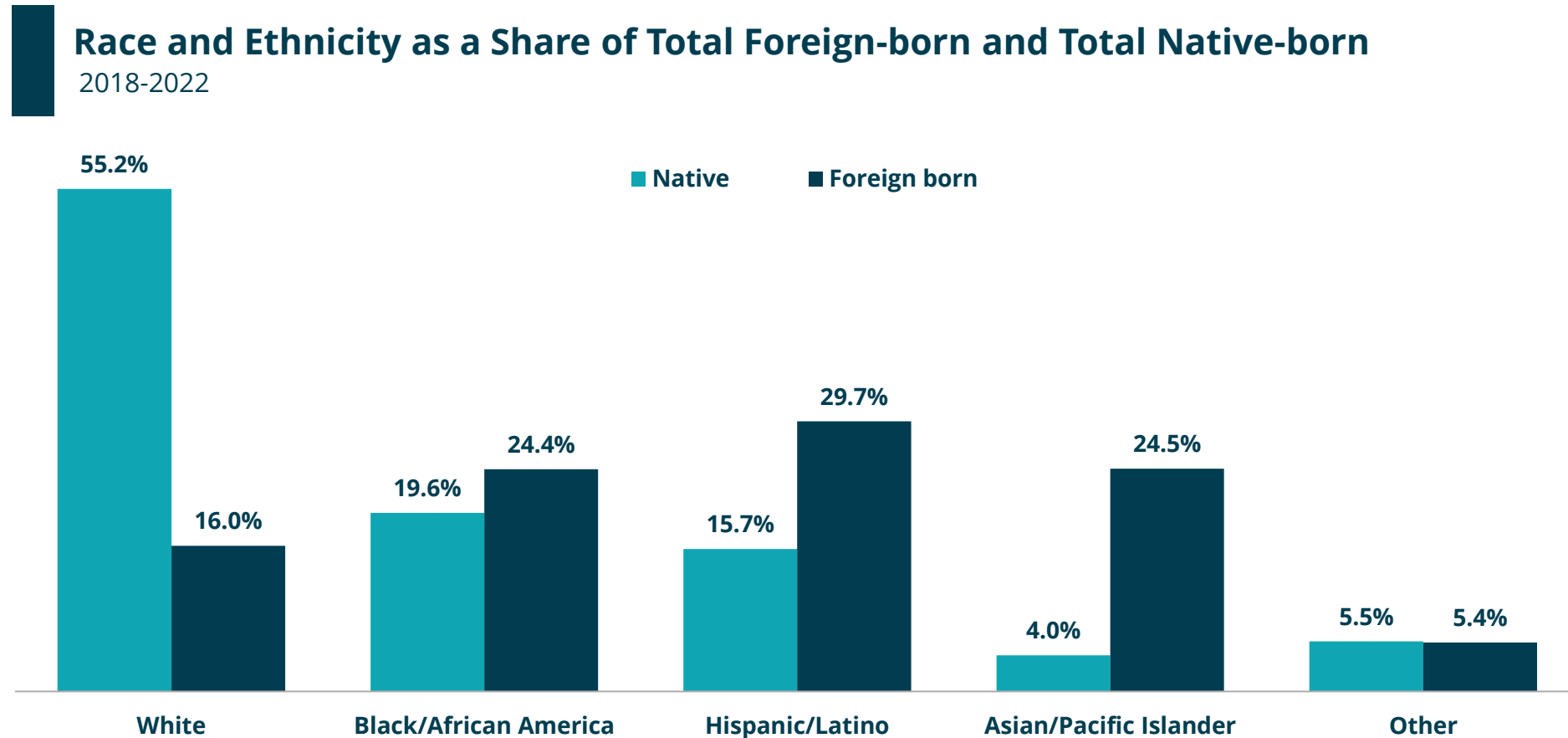
The foreign-born population of Boston in 1970 was smaller and predominantly European – Today's foreign-born population reflects changes to immigration policy

The foreign-born today are more likely to be Hispanic, Asian and Black/African American, reflecting origins in the Caribbean, Latin America, Africa, and Asia

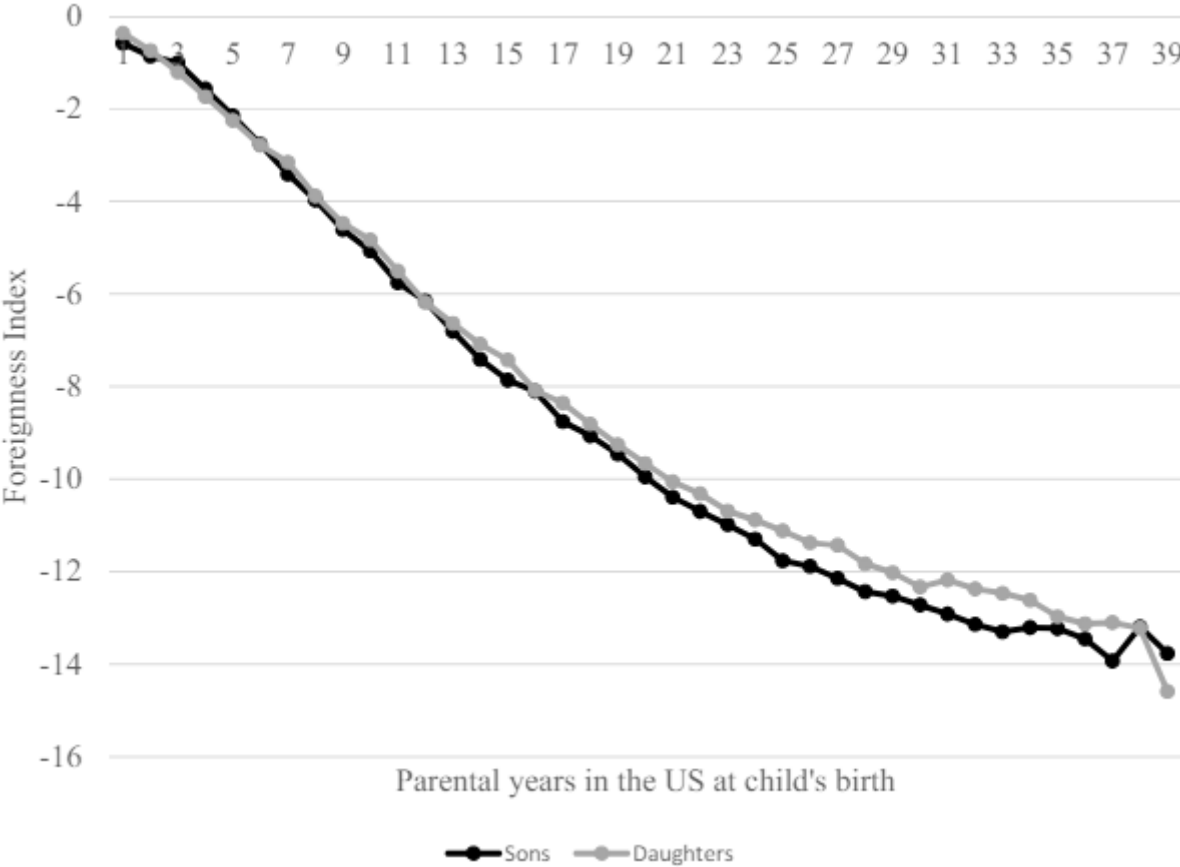

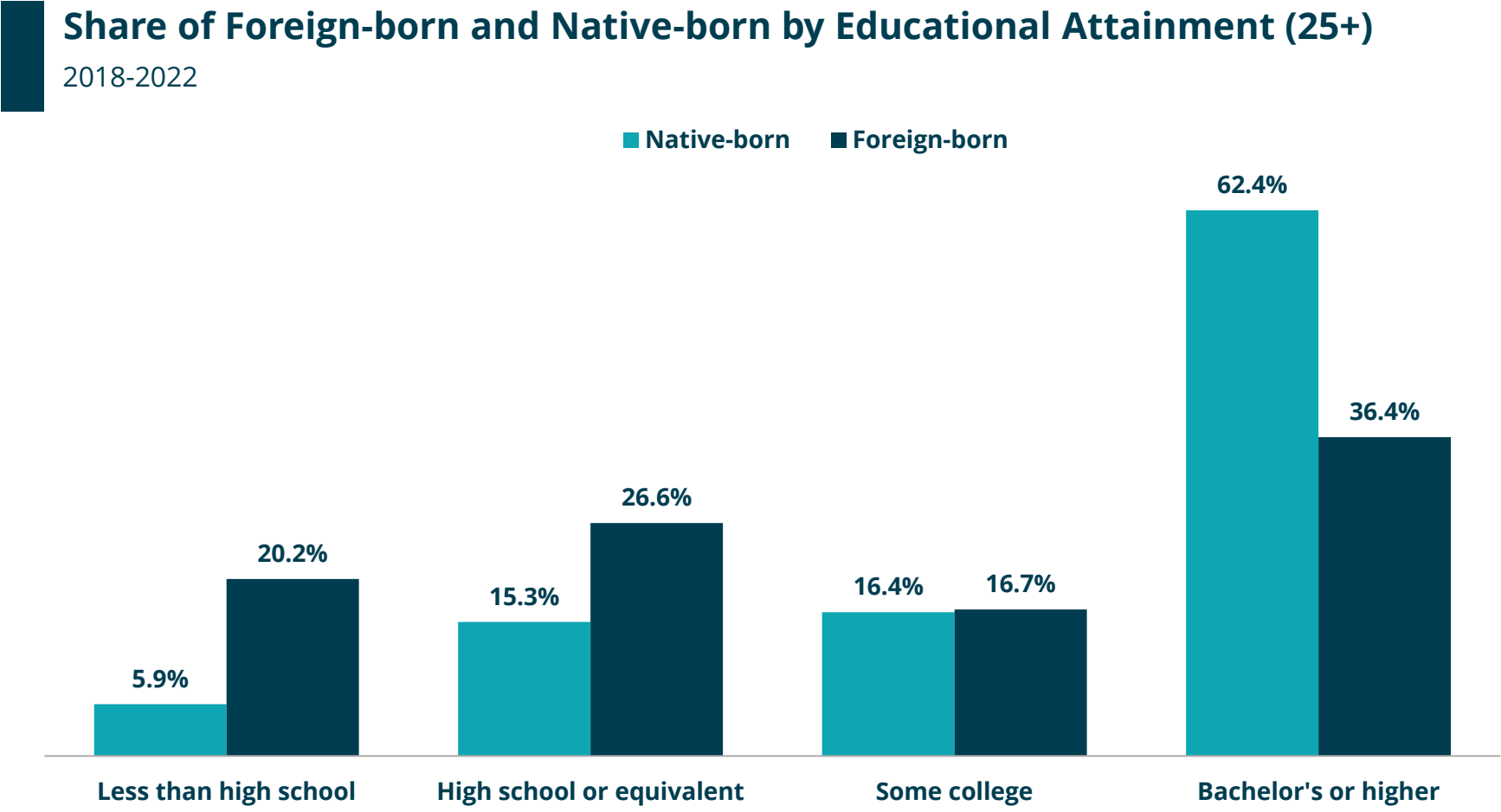
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Foreign born work in Boston through different arrangements

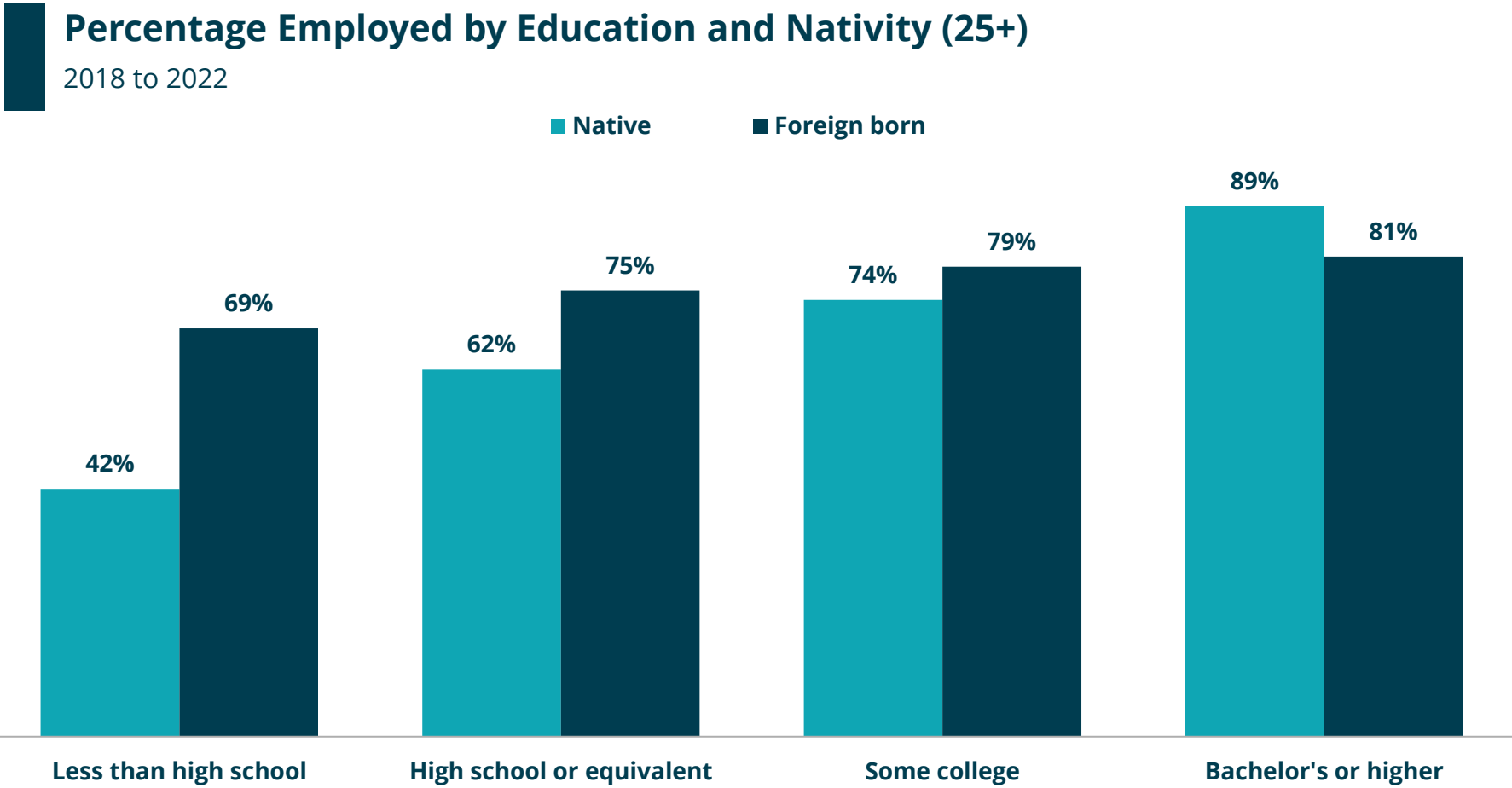
- **Visas for temporary work include:**
 - F1 student visas, H-1B for highly-skilled workers, H-2B for low-skilled non-agricultural workers and J-1 for exchange visitors
- **Temporary Protected Status (TPS) allows residents of countries designated by USCIS permission to work**
- **Refugees, asylees have permission to work; parole grants temporary permission to work**
- **Green-card holders can work permanently**
- **Naturalized citizens can work permanently**
 - About 55% of foreign born in Boston are naturalized citizens (ACS, 2022)
- **Many foreign born also work as unauthorized workers**

U.S. immigration policy favors those with higher levels of education, but nearly half of Boston's foreign born residents aged 25+ have a high school education or less



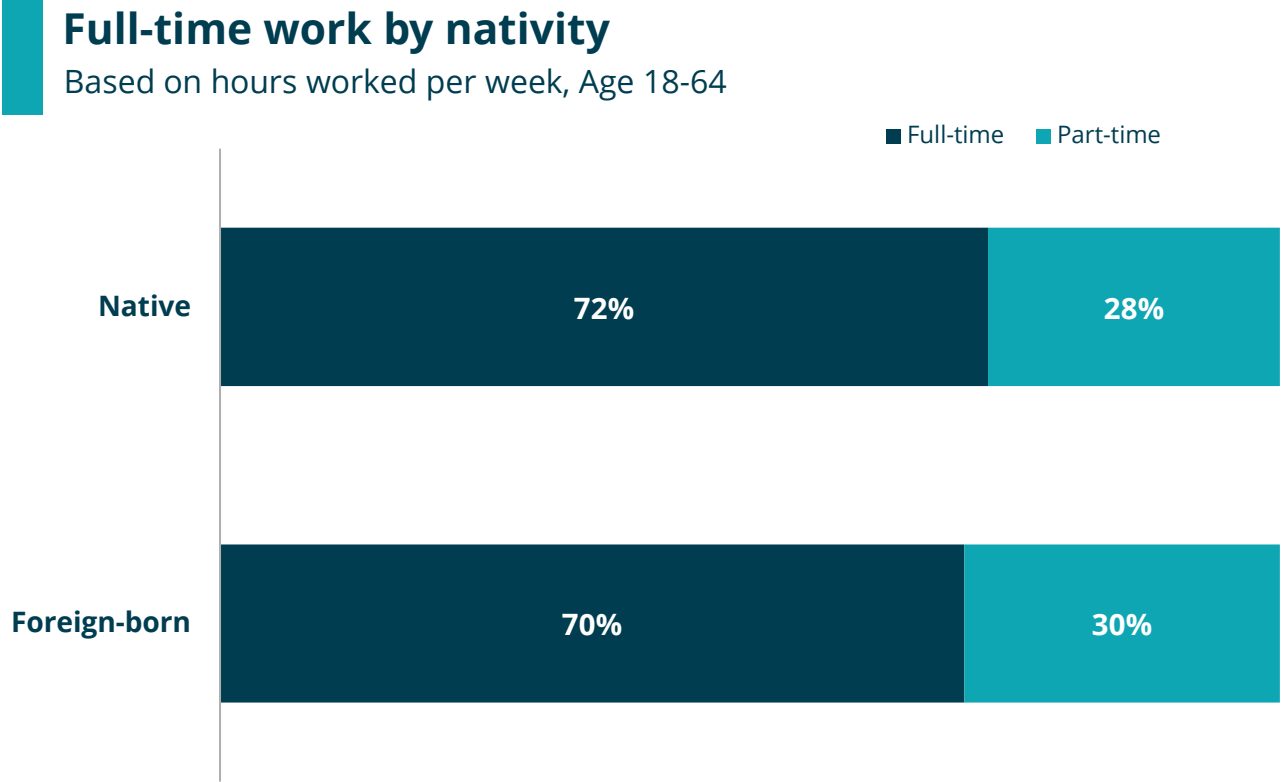

Foreign-born Boston residents are slightly more likely to work full-time (35 hours or more)

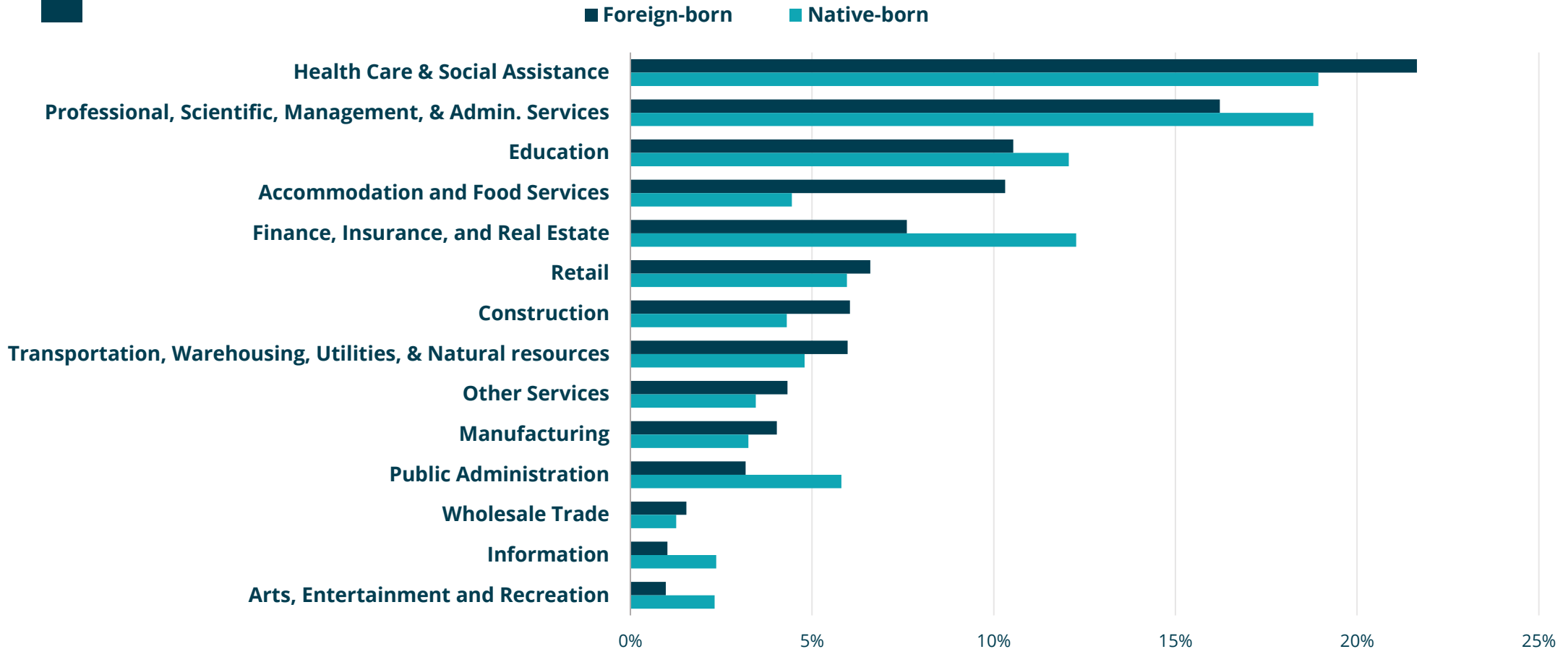

2018-2022

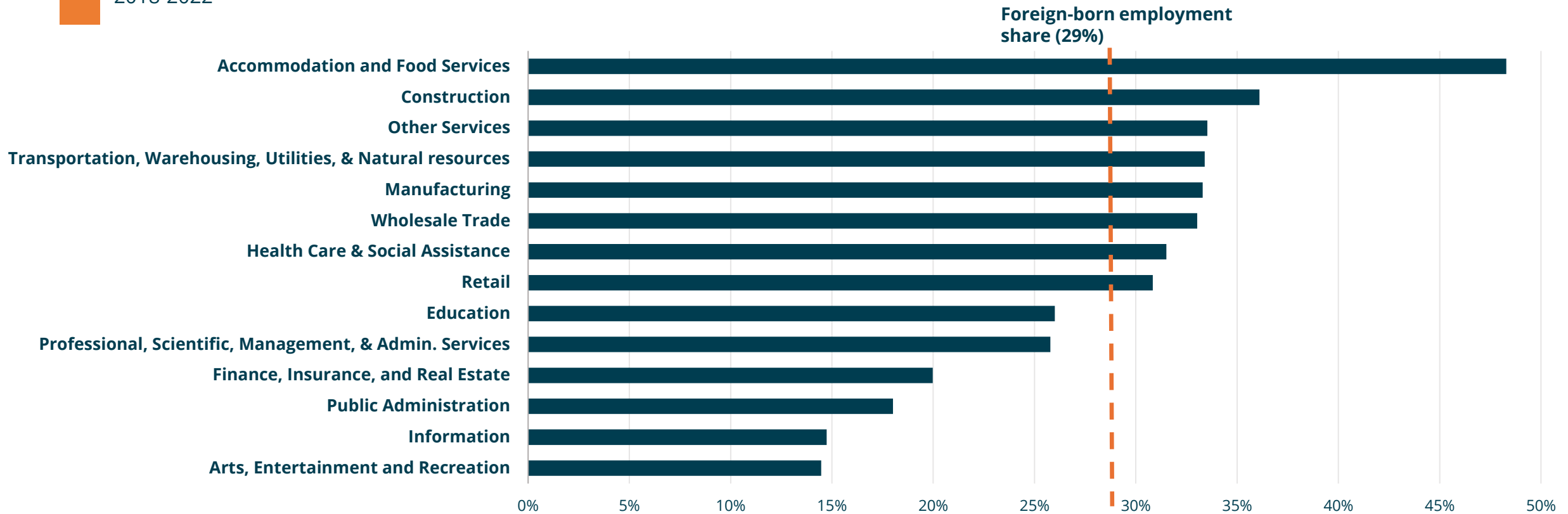

2018-2022

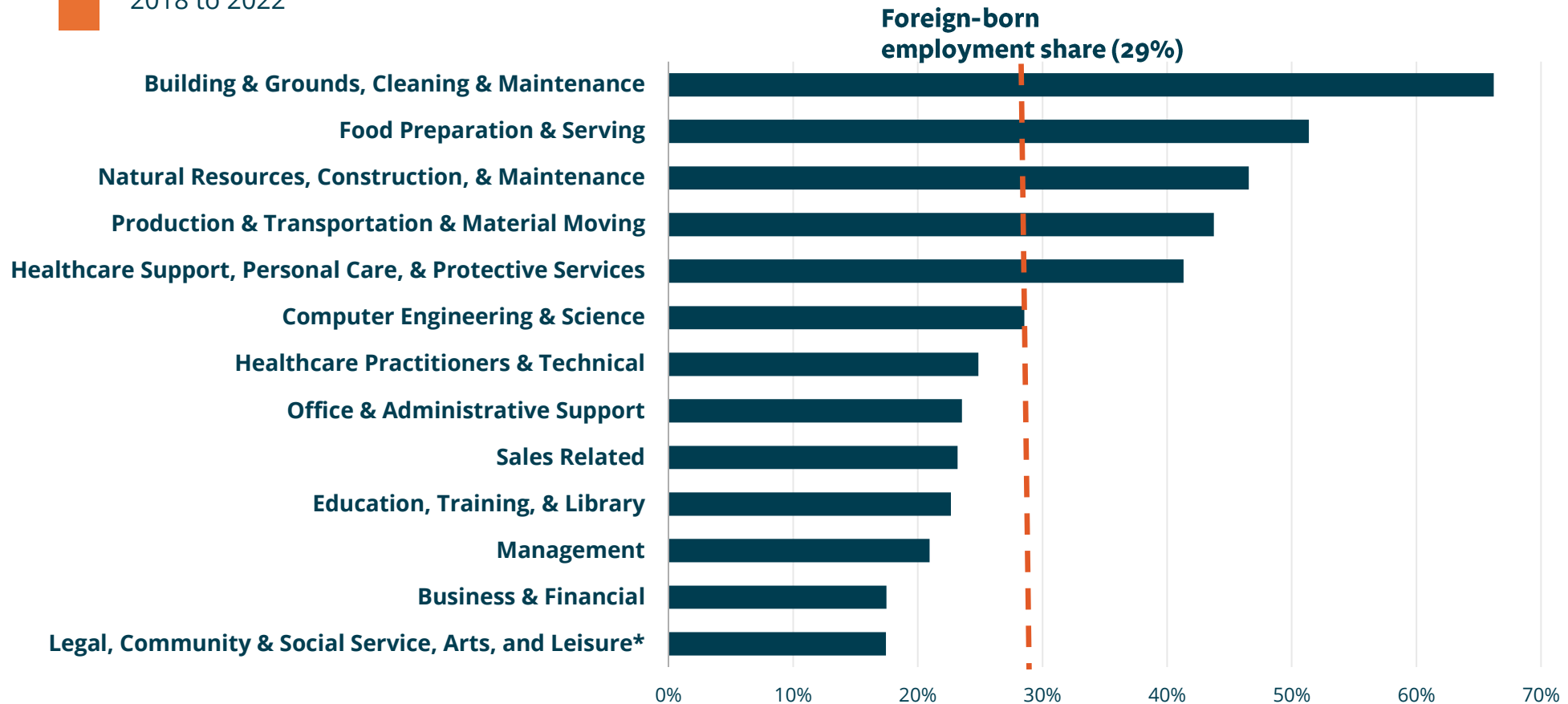

2018 to 2022

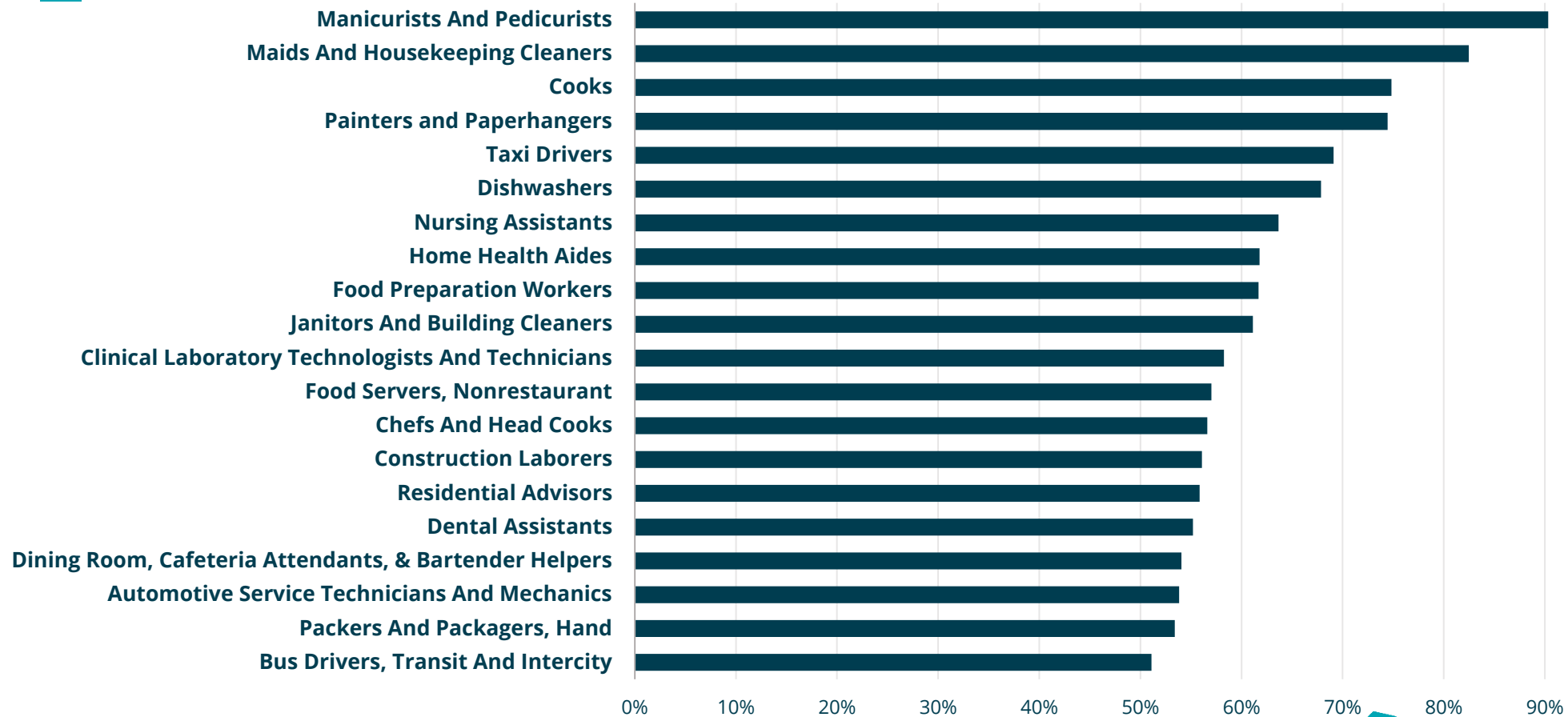

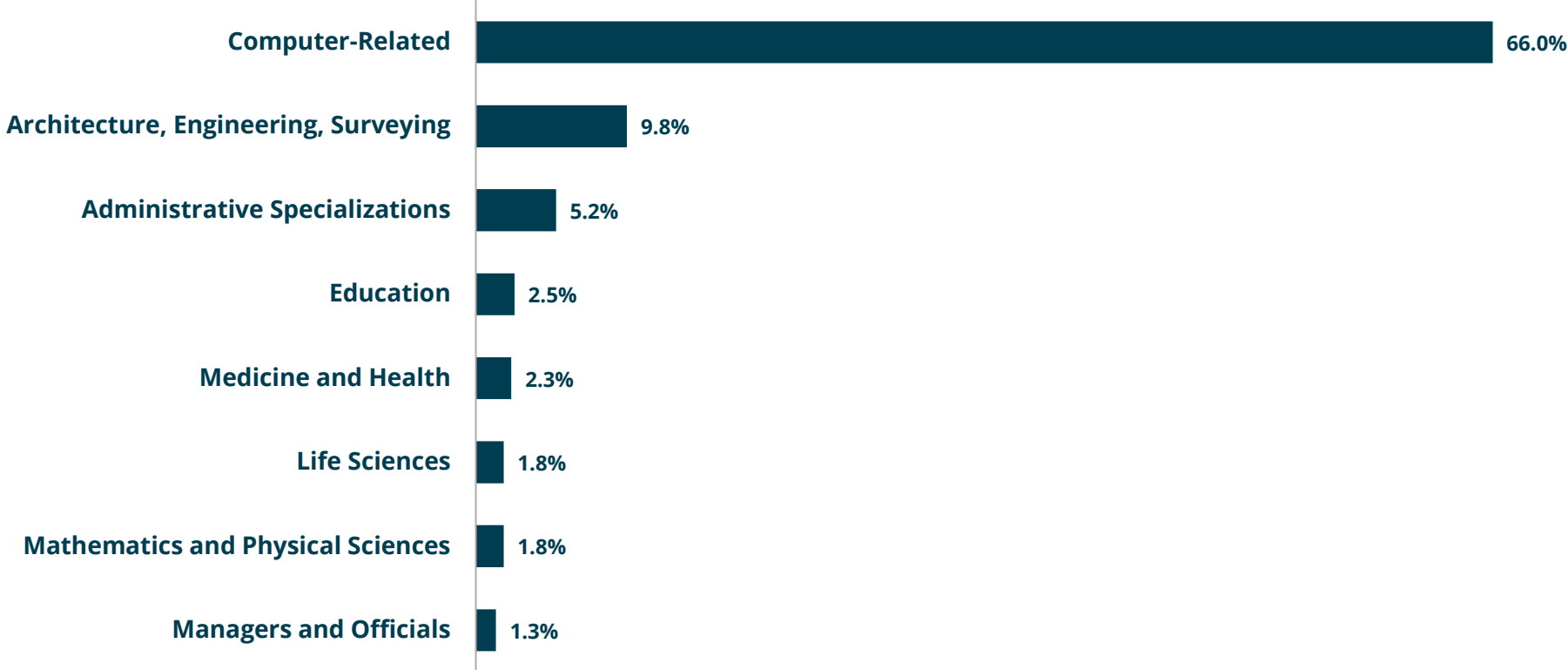
Workers with college degrees are often hired through the H-1B visa



- These are temporary working visas for 3 years, can be renewed for a total work time of 6 years.
- Employees must have at least a Bachelor's degree, and work duties must be complex and specialized.
- Annual cap nationally: 65,000+ for BA and an extra 20,000 for graduate degrees.

Major Occupational Groups of Approved H1-B Beneficiaries FY 2022

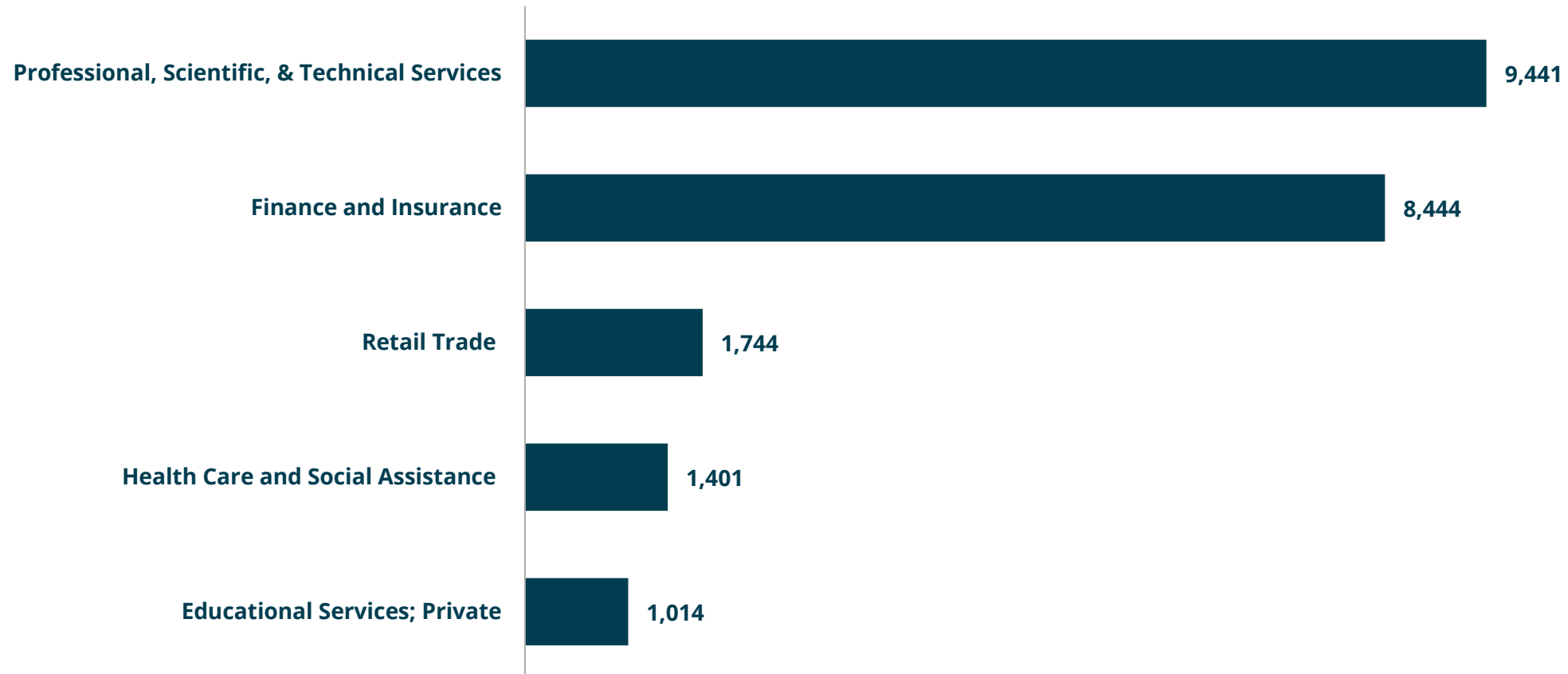

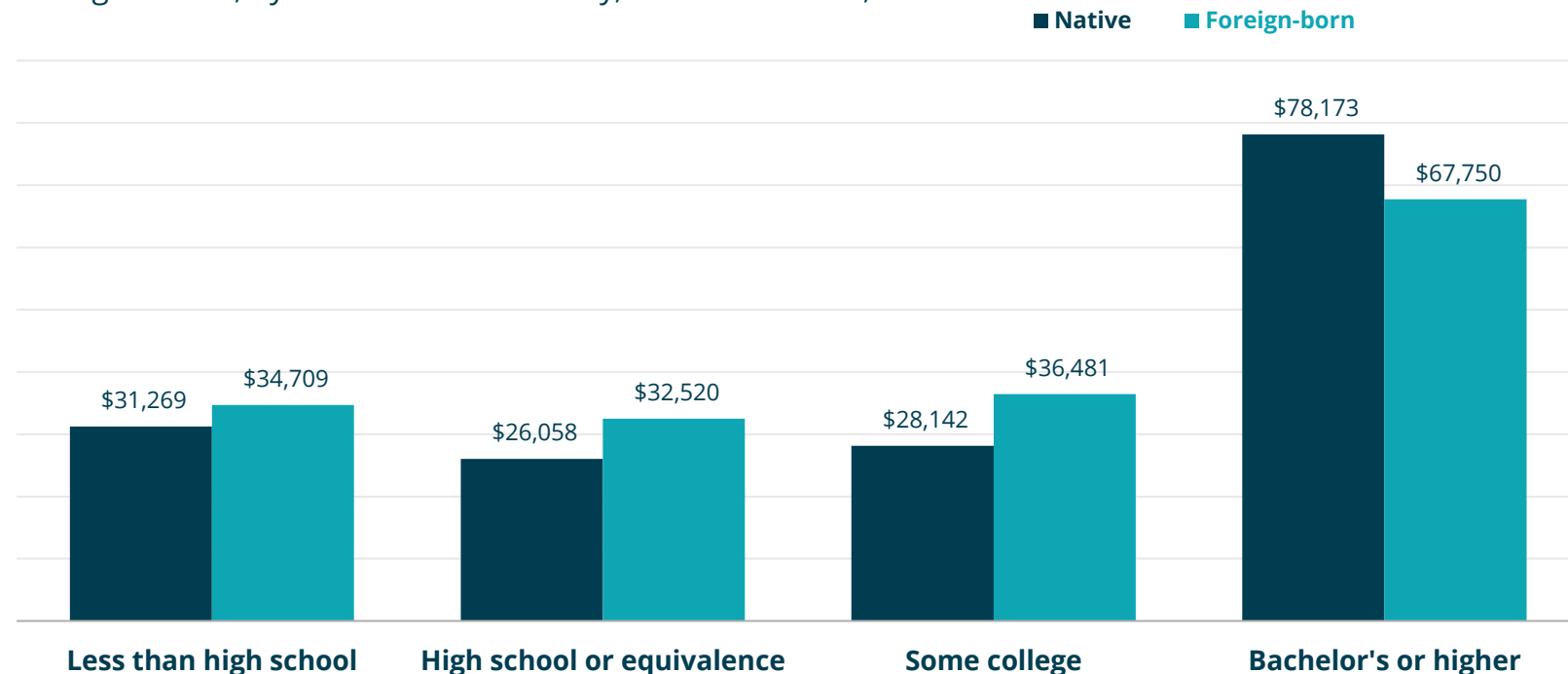
