





UNITED STATES POPULATION IS PROJECTED TO GROW MORE SLOWLY





SINCE 2011, BOSTON BIRTHS HAVE DECLINED, BUT DEATHS HAVE INCREASED


BIRTHS AND DEATHS BOSTON 2000 TO 2022











BOSTON'S YOUNG ADULTS ARE PROJECTED TO INCREASE UNTIL 2025 AND THEN DECLINE



BOSTON'S WORKING AGE POPULATION IS PROJECTED TO INCREASE THROUGH 2035


25 TO 64 YEARS

AS THE BABY BOOMERS AGE, BOSTON'S OLDER POPULATION INCREASES RAPIDLY THROUGH 2035


65 YEARS AND OLDER
